Named and Shamed

Liar, Liar Pants on Fire!

After years of litigation and millions of dollars spent on defending the indefensible in almost every level of court-ship in the land and after years of falsehoods and innuendo, denial and obstruction, the James Hardie caravan of shame has finally ground to a shuddering halt.

The High Court of Australia has handed down its decision that the seven non-executive members of the board of directors of the James Hardie group knowingly misled the Australian Stock Exchange by falsely declaring that there were sufficient funds in the Asbestos Compensation Fund to cover all future claims when in fact, all seven knew that the pool fell short of more than \$1 Billion. It could never meet the needs of the many victims waiting in line for compensation and justice. This decision effectively slammed the door shut on any future appeals or court action leaving them nowhere to run and nowhere to hide and branding them virtual liars.

They then went on to suggest that their flight to the Netherlands was a simple tax saving exercise... more lies. In fact, expert opinion tells us that taxes for companies in that country are higher than here in Australia. This was a simple case of “let’s dump a few bucks on the doorstep and get the hell out of here”.

ADFA’s President, Barry Robson, is quoted as saying, “victims of Asbestos Related Diseases across the country will be feeling huge relief at today’s decision. This is a tremendously satisfying day for all of us who smelt a rat back in March 2001 when James Hardie originally announced its compensation fund. Since then the company has used every PR and legal trick in the book to escape responsibility for its misleading conduct”.

Members of ADFA and all those afflicted with Asbestos Related Diseases, now await the outcome of the High Court’s decision on penalties to be handed down. Hopefully, they will be severe enough to send a clear message to all those in similar positions of power that they still have obligations to tell the truth



and not joust with the integrity and serious values involved when making corporate decisions.

These seven people by their own actions have knowingly destroyed their reputations and dragged their credibility through the mire of any social acceptance. We hope a lesson has been learned.



Quips from the Courtrooms

In handing down sentences to the Terrible Ten in the case against James Hardie in the supreme court on 6 May, the words of Justice Ian Gzell were ominous. “There will be no exoneration of any of the defendants”. In the case against Meredith Hellicar he described her as a most “unsatisfactory witness” and had grave doubts about her “unsatisfactory evidence”.

Commissioner David Jackson said of Peter Macdonald at the Jackson enquiry into James Hardie, “There was evidence Mr Macdonald knowingly lied in a media release issued to the Australian Stock Exchange in February 2001. He ought reasonably to have known that the information in the media release was false in material in particular and materially misleading”.

FORMER James Hardie general counsel and company secretary Peter Shafron also came in for criticism by Justice Jackson when he questioned the integrity of Peter Shafron and said, “In considering Mr Shafron’s response to this topic, it is necessary to keep in mind he was prepared to be deceitful where Asbestos was concerned”.

Planned Integrated Recycling Facility at Camellia

At a meeting on May 9th, concerned members of the Asbestos Diseases Foundation of Australia and senior representatives from Remondis, a multi-national waste management group, came together to discuss the group's intention to build a \$25M waste processing plant on the now disused vacant land which was once the site of the former James Hardie Asbestos plant at Camellia in Western Sydney.

Concerns were expressed by ADFA when it became known that a concrete cap had been placed on the site when the plant was demolished and this cap was to be broken or breached when construction eventually took place. ADFA is well aware of the dangers of disturbing abandoned Asbestos sites and this was discussed in great detail.

The facility will process up to 150,000 tonnes of waste annually on the seven hectare site and consist of 100,000 tonnes of commercial and industrial waste and 50,000 tonnes of household waste. Some 65 people will be employed when full production is reached. The project has been classified as "State Significant" and requires the consent of the Minister for Planning and Infrastructure, The Hon. Brad Hazard MP.

Remondis executives displayed various maps and drawings of the proposed structure and noted all safety measures which will be put in place to protect the area should any Asbestos tailings be present. It was

pointed out by Remondis that only a very small area of the site was to be disturbed at the western end of the building and this piece of the property was to be covered by two meters of specially manufactured clay for this purpose. ADFA believes Remondis is taking every precaution to safeguard the area and meets all necessary requirements to comply with the Planning and Assessment Act. Members of ADFA have inspected the site and received assurances that no danger exists there now and in the future.

Asbestos seminar proposed for Broken Hill

The President of the Asbestos Diseases Foundation of Australia says he was shocked to find just one person in Broken Hill accredited to remove the substance. Barry Robson, who has been in the city for the past week, says given the high levels of asbestos in homes in the region, there should be more accredited asbestos removalists.

"It's a very low number I was very surprised that there was only one.

"I'll be going back to Sydney and recommending to the executive that we look at holding a seminar in Broken Hill because I don't think it will go astray."

Mr Robson says the seminar will warn people of the dangers of asbestos and how it can be removed safely.

"Everyone knows about the houses in the townships but they also forget about all the fibro asbestos-sheeted buildings on properties out of the township.

The Time Bomb in British Schools

Exposure to Asbestos fibres can cause lung cancer and another fatal cancer of the lining to the lung call Mesothelioma. It is not a problem confined to industrial workers nor it is a problem of the past. More than 75% of Britain's state schools contain Asbestos. Much of it is badly maintained. Over 140 school teachers have died from Mesothelioma in the past ten years. An unknown number of cleaners, administration staff and caretakers have also died. It is estimated that for every teachers death, nine children will die as a result of direct exposure to Asbestos in Schools.

Coffee and Asbestos in Brazil

In a country where graft and corruption is accepted as akin to someone buying a bottle of milk, it comes as no surprise that the Brazilian Government has now removed all restrictions on the use of Asbestos. Ultimately the devastation this move will bring to innocent families can only be guessed at although the rape of the Brazilian Rainforests has a parallel and appears to be as off-handed and cavalier a gesture as one benefiting such dictatorships.



Aftermath of Natural Disasters

Reliable reports coming in state that following devastating floods after torrential rain, large collections of deadly Asbestos are accumulating on roadways and footpaths in suburban areas.

Canada's Shame

The Canadian Government is yet to make a decision on a proposal to make a \$58M dollar grant to reinstate the Asbestos mine in the town of Asbestos two miles east of Montreal in the province of Quebec. Most of the Asbestos mined there is destined for India and to this end the Indians are lobbying hard on behalf of the mine owners also. Canada has plans to eliminate tariffs on exports to India and a move described by Makit Gupta, Co-ordinator of the Occupational and Environmental Health Network of India, "an appalling treaty of all ethical codes of human behaviour".





Looking Back

with Mike O'Donnell

THE chairman of the US organisation Victims of Fibreglass, Richard Munson told a press conference organised by the AMWU that fibreglass companies had "cloned" asbestos.

Munson is a former distributor of fibreglass products in the US who stopped selling them when he learned of the dangers. He made it clear both before and at the press conference that he now heads a company making a competitive insulation product, cellulose, which he claims is safe.

"Their product is more dangerous to human beings than asbestos," Munson said.

"We are dealing with the same people who made asbestos products," he said. In the 1950s they realised they were going to be regulated out of business so they looked for an alternative product".

"In 1955 leaders of the fibreglass industry were shown photos by their own scientists of glass fibres bigger than the ones produced now penetrating into human tissue."

Munson said fibreglass was an even more dangerous product than asbestos because the fibres were coated with a mixture of phenol and

formaldehyde to cut down the transfer of heat between the fibres.



"We are facing a problem of massive human suffering," he said. "In five years from now people won't be talking about asbestos, they'll be talking about fibreglass. "They'll be talking about taking it out of schools, out of airport ceilings. These fibreglass manufacturers kill for sales and profits.

"There are people who sit at the top making multi-million dollar salaries while wasting workers.

"If ever there was a role for unions to play it is for inserting themselves in between the worker and the health problem.

Manufacturers in the US have killed more than 100,000 insulation installers and they knew clear back into the 1930s that this was deadly, they knew it would kill.

"They are professional liars and professional killers. In 1955 evidence was laid **on** the table of the head of the Owens Corning Fibreglass company that showed glass fibres had the same effect on laboratory animals as asbestos, but they elected to go ahead and produce it."

Munson said there were 13 doctors on the staff of the United Auto Workers Union in the US who had reviewed the fibreglass situation and said it should be regulated the same as asbestos.

"It should be recognised as a carcinogenic agent," he said.

Munson said fibreglass insulation already in place in the ceilings of Australian homes should be covered to prevent contact with air that would allow the fibres to float into homes.

Important News from the Dust Diseases Board

The Dust Diseases Board will soon be writing to people with lump sums held in the Board's Trust Account to explain how the Board manages that money, the taxation and Centrelink implications and available options for managing the money. The interest earned on money held in the Board's accounts is paid out in June and December each year. The interest is classed as income by the Taxation Office and by Centrelink and may impact on your pension entitlements. There is no requirement for you to keep your money with the Board. You can have the money paid into your bank account so that you can manage or invest it yourself. The Board will be encouraging all its clients to obtain independent financial advice to determine how to best manage their lump sum payments. 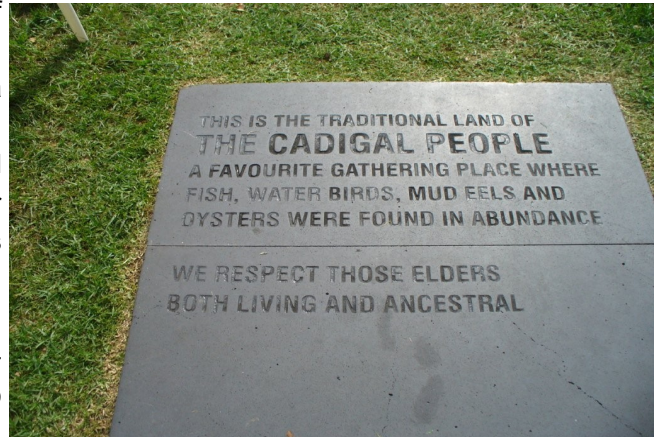

These 7 workers were Bernie Banton, Antonio Cerasoli, Anthony Cini, Ronald Purvis, Angus Stewart and William Tuckwell who all passed away from mesothelioma and James Jeffcoate who passed away from asbestosis. All of these workers were clients of Turner Freeman.

The ceremony was held at the Workplace Memorial located at the former Goodlet & Smith Brick Pit site at Merrylands. It was a moving ceremony and the speakers included the Mayor of Holroyd City Council, Councillor Yvette Whitfield and Cheryl Romer from the Workplace Tragedy Support Group.

Brush with deadly fibres taking its toll

THE recent High Court decision in the James Hardie case will come as a welcome relief to asbestos victims and their families but the full impact of asbestos in Australia is yet to be felt.

The High Court found last week that seven James Hardie directors breached corporate law in relation to the James Hardie asbestos compensation fund.

The outcome of this case is a very welcome one and gives us a timely reminder that corporate responsibility exists and those who try to avoid it will eventually be brought to account by our regulators and courts.

There are many people who will feel this closes a sad and tragic chapter in our history.

Unfortunately, the evidence points to the contrary. Deaths from asbestos-related diseases have not yet peaked and they are not forecast to peak until 2020 because of the extended latency period for this type of disease.

It takes between 20 and 50 years from exposure to the development of the cancer.

In 1962, Dr Jim McNulty diagnosed the first mesothelioma case in Australia in a worker employed at CSR's blue asbestos mine at Wittenoom.

In 2010, 642 Australians died from mesothelioma and a further 112 from asbestosis.

Researchers estimate that for every death from mesothelioma there are another two from lung cancer caused by asbestos.

More than 2000 Australians dying each year from asbestos-related disease is a terrible toll.

In the next 20 years, an estimated 30,000 to 40,000 Australians will be diagnosed with an asbestos-related disease.

These are terrible diseases. Asbestosis is scarring of the lungs usually caused by high levels of asbestos exposure. Breathing becomes progressively more difficult and oxygen therapy is required. It slowly suffocates its victims.

Mesothelioma is an insidious disease and can be caused by quite low levels of exposure.

Most people with mesothelioma die within 18 months of being diagnosed.

The first wave of asbestos victims includes those who handled the raw fibres.

Among this number are asbestos mine and mill employees and factory workers.

The second wave of asbestos victims includes those who handled asbestos products, the chippies who built with fibro, the plumbers who lagged pipes with asbestos, the railway workers, the electricians and the power station workers.

The third wave includes those who never worked with asbestos.

These are men and women who built, renovated or demolished a house, garage or fence containing asbestos, or washed asbestos-laden clothes.

And people exposed at home as children from playing with asbestos pieces or those such as Lincoln Hall, who died recently aged 56 from mesothelioma, having helped his dad build a cubbyhouse from asbestos as a child.

Recent research from Western Australia is that the toll from this third wave is rising.

It's easy to forget that asbestos wasn't com-

pletely banned in Australia until 2003 and thousands of homes and workplaces around the country still contain this deadly material.

The Gillard Government is awaiting a report, expected in the middle of the year, from the Asbestos Management Review, which is investigating arrangements for managing asbestos and whether improvements can be made.

The Government is also funding research into these terrible diseases - research to improve diagnosis and treatment options.

Australians love getting in and having a go - renovating and fixing things around the home - but need to take care not to expose themselves or their families to asbestos.

About a third of homes built between 1945 and the late 1980s contain some asbestos products - in walls, ceilings, eaves, kitchens, bathrooms, vinyl floor tiles, sheds and garages.

In good condition and if undisturbed these pose little risk, as the fibres are bound together in a solid matrix.

Get advice before renovating by contacting your local work health and safety authority or health department.

The use of this material has long been abandoned but the danger still exists and will continue to do so for many years to come. Then a resident, Barbara Scott, came forward and offered to re-instate the group and made us an offer to good to refuse. Her link with Asbestos came as a result of her uncle who had been diagnosed with Mesothelioma. Barbara goes about her work with a willingness and a lot of motivation and ADFA is fortunate to have her on board. Check out the hair-do!

As soon as practical, members of the Committee will convene a seminar in Wagga to lend support to Barbara and provide answers to Wagga residents which will allow them to obtain a broader picture in respect to the dangers of Asbestos and its lethal qualities.

ADFA would like to thank Barbara in her efforts and looks forward to a long and happy association.

That Sweden and Denmark were the first countries to introduce bans on asbestos production during the 1970's and 1980's. But the delay of a complete EU ban until 2005 caused catastrophe. Asbestos workers, their families and people living near factories are still dying today. Asbestosis and cancer of the lung and pleura (mesothelioma) are expected to kill 500,000 people by 2030.

That despite all that is known about the ill effects of Asbestos, more than two million tonnes are mined annually and Russia is now the leading producer of Asbestos world-wide followed by China, Kazakhstan, Brazil, Canada and Colombia. These countries accounted for 96% of world production in 2007 and deposits are estimated to last Russia for 100 years. The majority of the approximately one million tonnes of Asbestos produced annually is exported.

That a Perth Magistrates Court has found an international engineering company guilty of two counts of importing prohibited asbestos in machinery parts into Australia and has ordered them to pay \$64,000 in penalties and costs.



In 2009, Clyde Bergemann Senior Thermal (CBST) imported 62 machinery parts from China for the development of a power plant. Customs and Border Protection found that the machinery contained chrysotile asbestos. Chrysotile asbestos, commonly known as white asbestos, is a prohibited import under the customs regulations and can cause adverse health effects, including lung cancer. In June 2010, the company imported a further 60 parts containing chrysotile asbestos.

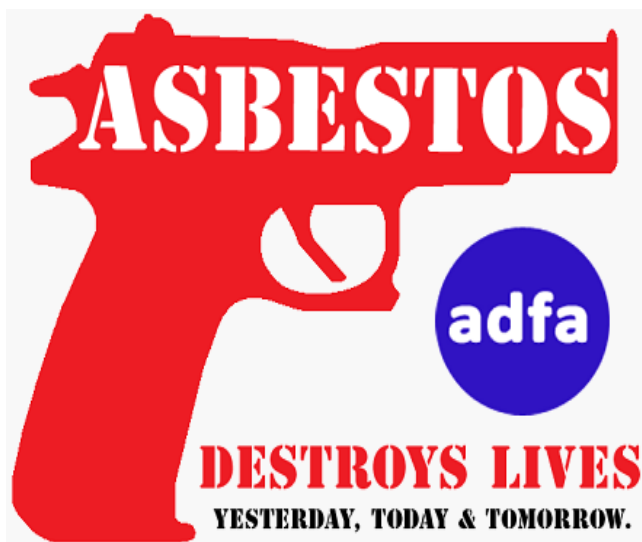
